Cultural stewardship is a broad subject that applies to archives, libraries, museums, historic preservation offices, language programs and others. Because it is broad, there are multiple choices of training opportunities. Please attend the training opportunities that are most applicable to your needs.

To earn the **Cultural Stewardship and Historic Preservation Certificate**, you must:

1. Submit a brief [application](#). Once your application is approved, you will receive additional information on the pre-conference webinars.
2. Participate in at least 20 hours of training, including self-paced webinars in advance of the conference, one full-day workshop on October 9, and conference sessions specific to the certificate being earned on October 10 and 11.
3. Complete an evaluation survey and write a brief report.

Certificates will be provided after your special project and report are received.

Below is a schedule of eligible sessions related to the **Cultural Stewardship and Historic Preservation Certificate** program. If multiple sessions are offered at the same time, you may choose the one most appropriate to your needs. In the event there is a conference session you wish to attend that is not a part of the programs listed below, you may substitute a webinar.
