Saving Recorded History

In 2018 and 2019, ATALM partnered with the Association of Moving Image Archivists to host Community Archiving Workshops. With funding from the National Endowment for the Arts, ATALM and AMIA are conducting a national needs assessment of the needs of organizations holding Native audiovisual materials, hosting five regional workshops, and continuing the Community Archiving Workshops at ATALM conferences. ATALM is receiving \$25,000 for its supporting role. Preventive Conservation Certificates

In 2018, ATALM partnered with the Foundation for Advancement in Conservation to offer training in emergency preparedness. That successful collaboration led to an IMLS-funded grant to enable FAIC to provide in-person training at 2020, 2021, and 2022 ATALM conferences on Preventive Care of Collections. The project consists of 1) webinars 2) online courses 3) in-person workshops in collaboration with the Association of Tribal Archives, Libraries, and Museums (ATALM) and 4) on-demand online resources. FAIC staff is managing the project along with an Advisory Group composed of members of AIC's Collection Care Network, representatives of allied professional groups, and users of the site. It is expected that a total of 90 certificates will be awarded over the three-year period.

Doris Duke Charitable Foundation

ATALM has been asked to serve as the national coordinator for a two-year project to help revitalize the Doris Duke American Indian Oral History Collection. The collection is housed at seven universities and consists of around 6,000 recordings from the 1960-70s. DDCF wants to digitize the collections, translate recordings made in Native languages, transcribe recordings, and make them available to the originating communities. Much of the work will be performed by consultants. ATALM has been offered \$300,000 to manage the project.

Social Media Presence

ATALM has 25,117 followers on Facebook and reaches an average of 100,000 people a month. It has five stars. ATALM has 866 Twitter followers. ATALM is working on a new social media strategy that may focus more on Twitter and less on Facebook.

2020 International Conference of Indigenous Archives, Libraries, and Museums

The conference is scheduled from November 30-December 2 at the Downtown Washington, DC Renaissance.

The Institute of Museum and Library Services has committed to extending our Cooperative Agreement for two more years at \$250,000 per year.

Kevin Gover, Director of the National Museum of the American Indian is serving as Chair.

COVID-19 has presented a few uncertainties, but staff recommends continuing with planning and accepting registrations, but providing full refunds if the conference does not take place. Exhibitors, advertisers, and others will also receive full refunds. The situation will be assessed in October and a final decision made.

In the interim, planning continues. As a result of a national Call for Proposals, we received and reviewed 235 proposals. Following review by the 30-member Program Planning Committee, the following were accepted:

- 18 Flash Talks
- 22 Inspire Talks
- 24 Hands-on Labs

Culture Builds Communities

With a \$250,000 grant from IMLS and an additional \$160,000 from the National Museum of the American Indian and the Margaret A. Cargill Philanthropies, ATALM is working with planners, architects, designers, and other experts to provide professional training, resources, and consultations.

The project is:

- 1. Supporting nine Native communities seeking to build cultural centers, including site visits to recently built cultural centers in Oklahoma and access to a team of expert grant writers, planners, and architects;
- 2. Providing a research trip to Washington, DC for Cohort members to work with the NMAI, the Natural History Museum, and other collecting institutions holding Native materials to identify culturally specific items held in the collections and learn more the loan process. This site visit will help Cohort members better understand facility requirements which will help them in the design activities, will help them envision future exhibit possibilities, and will build relationships between Cohort members and collecting institutions.
- 3. Developing a Resource Directory of Professional Contractors and Consultants; and
- 4. Developing Case Studies on a minimum of 10 cultural facilities built within the last 20 years. Case Studies will include lessons learned, design parameters, exhibit information, programming, and other information that Native communities may

reference when seeking to build facilities, create exhibits, and engage the community.

Forty communities applied to participate. The following nine were selected:
